

### Please Park in Designated Areas

**Parking under oak trees is no longer permitted.** Soil compaction, resulting from parked vehicles is a serious problem for trees. Soil compaction destroys the soil's natural porosity by eliminating air spaces within the soil. Compacted soil contains little air, holds little available water, and is harder, less penetrable, and more resistant to water penetration. Consequently, root growth and tree health suffer. There is ample parking by the clubhouse and next to guest stalls. Please do not park near tie rails, arena gates, or by the stable area.

### Slow down!

Activity at RBR will be ramped up during the summer as Tom Sawyer Camps begin their camp schedule starting June 15. As a reminder to all members and member guests, please slow down as you drive through the main gate and onto club property. Watch out for and yield to children on horseback. Horses and fast cars do not mix. In order to ensure a safe environment for children and horses, parents and caretakers must **pick up and drop off at the top of the ramp** between the big arena and the sun pen. If parents or caretakers are staying to observe a lesson or would like to walk down to the stables to pick up a child, there is ample parking by the clubhouse or guest stalls. **The lower roads by the stables are restricted to boarders and service vehicles.**



### RBRCO School Field Trip

On May 20, fourth graders from PUSD Cleveland Elementary School, participated in the "Art of the Horse" program, funded by Rose Bowl Riders Charitable Organization.

Working closely with the Pasadena Unified School District, Bonnie Hedrick developed and organized the school trip. Sue Lafferty provided an equine fact-filled stable tour where students met horses, learned about different colors, breeds, and vocations of the horses. Shannon Griffin entertained with a thrilling jumping demonstration in the main arena. Joan Glasford and Karen Enzminger contributed expertise and hands-on help in all areas of the day's events. Patty Sue Jones led the clubhouse tour of "Children's Horse Art from Around the World," courtesy of Barnsdall Arts. Students viewed and discussed an authentic scroll painted by children in China, which depicts a herd of wild horses. The picnic area became an outdoor art studio where Patty instructed the class in creating an individual scroll with a horse drawing. Each child showed a completed artwork to Skipper, the horse model; and their Mrs. Tully, the teacher exclaimed, "the horse is actually looking at their art!" Maggie, Maverick, Bubba, and Skipper provided opportunities for student hugs, pets, and kisses. Thank you to all these volunteers – human and horse – for providing this community outreach program full of fun and facts for these Pasadena youth.
