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SIGN YOUR SMARTWAIVER!

As part of our progress on working toward the new lease with the City, RBR has had to upgrade our insurance coverage, so we have a new carrier. The new policy requires the Club to have a signed waiver on file and accessible for every member and guest which means we must move to an online environment. If you are a member who brings guests to RBR, your guests must also sign the online waiver. RBR rules and policies state: "Any person who is riding or working with horses must sign an RBR liability waiver."

The good news is that the Club now subscribes to the Smartwaiver app, so everyone can easily sign their waivers online!

If you have not signed the online waiver yet (most of you have, so thank you!), you can access the Smartwaiver app from the Rose Bowl Riders website from your phone or other device.

McConnell family and Anna was competing in schooling shows, IEL, the Flintridge shows and more. We were hooked!



ALTERNATIVE THERAPIES FOR HORSES: Veterinary Acupuncture, Equine Spinal Manipulation & PEMF, Oh My!

PEMF (Pulsed Electromagnetic Field Therapy)

PEMF stands for "Pulsed Electromagnetic Field" Therapy. A PEMF device creates a gently pulsing electromagnetic field which restores health of horses at a cellular level by stimulating cell metabolism, optimizing cell function and enhancing the body's natural ability to heal itself. PEMF might seem like a new technology in North America, but it has been used throughout Europe and other countries for more than 50 years! The PEMF machine creates a series of pulsing electromagnetic fields that travel from the main unit through the loop. As the loop is placed on or over the body, the electromagnetic field pulses ON and OFF and makes a soft clicking sound. As the electromagnetic field is pulsed ON, electrons are excited and the cells are expanded and "exercised". The electrically charged cell membrane is gently pulled by the pulsating electromagnetic field and the cell is "recharged". When the

Veterinary acupuncture treatments offer relief and healing and have been used on both humans and animals in China for thousands of years. Acupuncture needling causes micro trauma that in turn causes a local inflammatory effect. This inflammatory effect results in an increased local tissue



immune response, improved local tissue blood flow, and muscle and tissue relaxation. The success will vary according to the condition being treated and the number and frequency of veterinary acupuncture treatments. A simple acute problem, such as a sprain may require only one treatment, whereas more severe or chronic ailments may need several.

Equine Spinal Manipulation

The alignment of the spine is tied to numerous health issues and horses can benefit greatly from spinal manipulation which reduces pain or discomfort associated with certain medical conditions. Chiropractic uses controlled forces applied to specific joints or anatomic regions to cause a therapeutic response due to induced changes in joint structures, muscle function and neurological reflexes. These adjustments can correct disruption and restore normal joint motion.
